

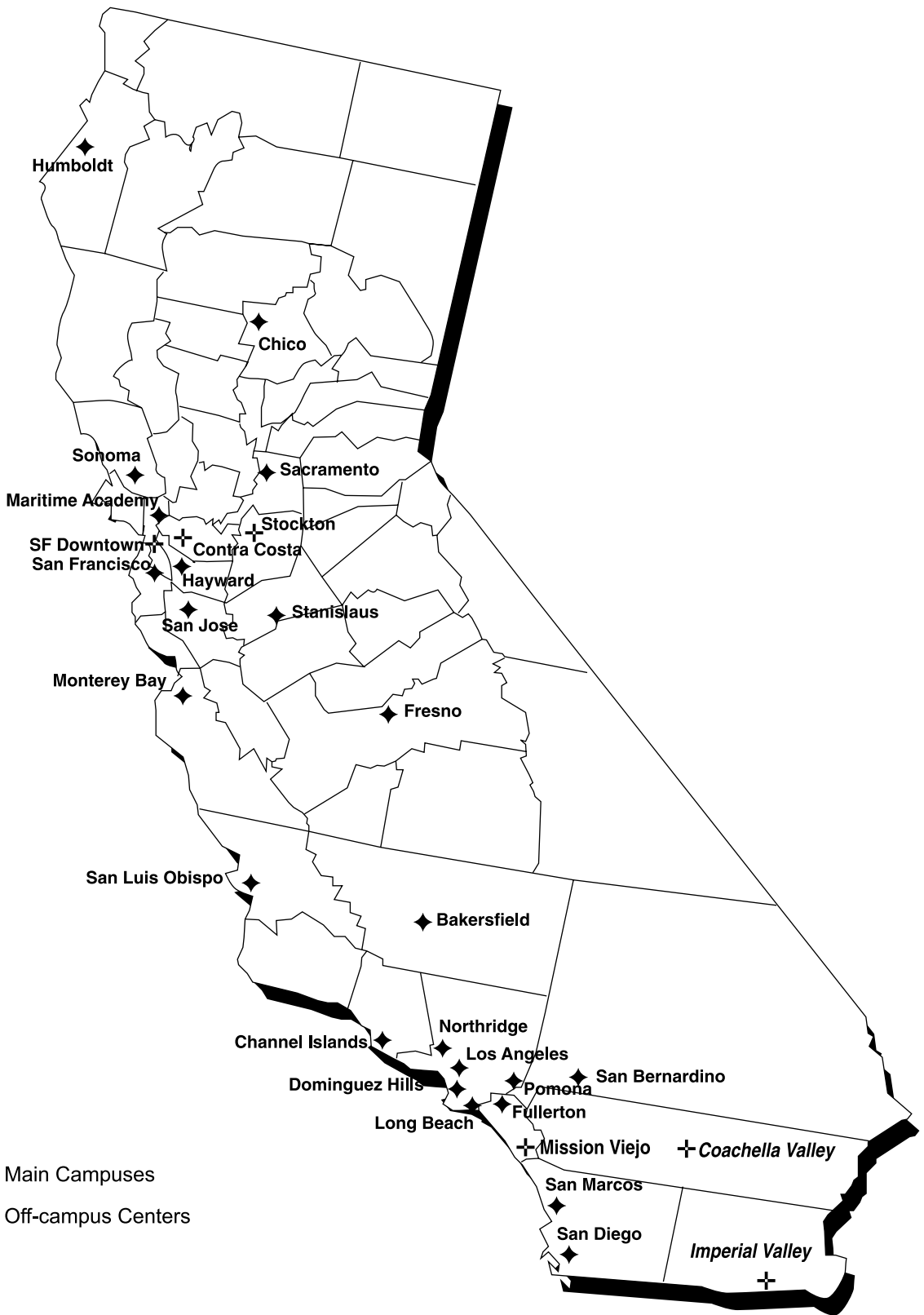

Foreword

The Statistical Abstract, first published in 1971, is prepared by the Division of Analytic Studies, Office of the Chancellor, California State University. The Abstract presents statistical information on all aspects of the California State University (CSU). It provides a comprehensive historical view of the system and its member campuses. The last Abstract, published in April of 2001, described the status of the CSU to July 2000. This edition will bring the Abstract series up to date, with coverage to July 2001.

Information pertaining to enrollment, applications, educational achievements and progress, and some areas of instruction are produced by the Division of Analytic Studies. The Division is also responsible for the design and production of the Abstract. Other divisions within the Chancellor's Office contributing to the preparation of the Abstract are: Academic Affairs, Business and Finance, Extended Education, Human Resources, Information Technology Services, International Programs, and Capital Planning, Design and Construction.

The Abstract is divided into seven major sections: Systemwide and Campus Enrollments, Student Profile, New Students, Academic and Support Programs, Education Access and Outcomes, Instruction, and Resources. Each section and/or subsection begins with introductory narratives, which describe the information presented on subsequent pages. These opening remarks are generally followed by one or more graphs that highlight issues or trends of particular importance to that area of university activity.

The California State University

The California State University was formed in 1961, when the 15 existing state colleges were organized as a system under the supervision of an appointed Board of Trustees and a systemwide Chancellor. The California State University and Colleges became the official name of the system in 1972. In 1982 this name was changed to the California State University.

The California State University system is now comprised of 22 campuses with a fall 2000 enrollment of 367,397 students and teaching force of slightly more than 20,000 faculty. It is one of the three publicly supported segments of higher education in the state. San Jose State University, originally established as a normal school devoted to the preparation of public school teachers, is the oldest campus in the system. Founded in 1857, it is the first institution of public higher education in California. CSU Channel Islands, scheduled to begin accepting students in fall of 2002, will be the newest campus in the system.

As the largest senior system of higher education in the nation, the CSU offers more than 1,600 bachelor's and master's degree programs in some 240 different subject areas, a variety of education credential programs, and a fully accredited statewide nursing curriculum.

All of the current 22 campuses are accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges. In addition, CSU campuses have 185 curricular programs accredited by national professional accrediting agencies.

Achieving academic excellence is a continuing goal of the system. Through its distinguished faculty, whose primary responsibility is teaching, the CSU sponsors and supports innovative educational programs and dedication to the highest ideals surrounding postsecondary education. While each campus has its own unique curricular and geographic character, all offer undergraduate and graduate instruction for professional and occupational goals as well as broad liberal education. All campuses require for graduation a basic program of "General Education-Breadth Requirements" regardless of the type of bachelor's degree or major field selected by the student.

The CSU confers over 60,000 degrees annually, which represents 50 percent of all bachelor's degrees and over 30 percent of the master's degrees granted by California colleges and universities. Since 1961, more than 2 million degrees have been conferred by the CSU system.
