

Introduction

The California State University is committed to providing opportunities in higher education to students with disabilities by making its programs, activities, and facilities fully accessible to persons with disabilities.

Some CSU campuses began providing specialized services to students with disabilities in the 1960s. In 1973, several campuses received state funding for this purpose. By 1979, all CSU campuses received state funds to develop disabled student services programs and serve qualified students attending the CSU. Since then, the number of students receiving services from the Disabled Student Services program and a commitment of state funding have grown simultaneously.

Efforts to expand postsecondary educational opportunities to people with disabilities were stimulated in large part by the passage of the Federal Rehabilitation Act of 1973. Since 1973, the California legislature and governor have enacted a variety of laws to provide special services for students with disabilities attending public postsecondary institutions. In addition, the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 provides civil rights protection to people with disabilities.

In 1987, the governor signed into law Assembly Bill 746 (Hayden), a comprehensive bill that addressed attendance at postsecondary institutions by students with disabilities. This legislation lists services that may be provided with state funds, state funding provisions, and reporting requirements.

Services provided to students attending the CSU are based on federal and state regulations and the CSU systemwide *Policy for Provision of Serving Students with Disabilities*. The systemwide policy refines the six types of disabilities

by which students are categorized for reporting purposes: visual limitation, communication disability, deafness, mobility limitation, learning disability, and other functional limitations.

Services provided are those that allow students to participate in the full range of campus programs and activities. Some of the services include readers, notetakers, sign language interpreters, transcription services, test-taking assistance, mobility assistance and orientation to campus facilities, registration assistance, special parking, specialized tutoring, disability-related counseling, and special equipment and materials. All CSU students with verified disabilities are eligible to receive services.

Data on students served through Disabled Student Services provide information on CSU students with verified disabilities who are regularly enrolled and request and receive special support services through campus Disabled Student Services programs each fall term. Those who are enrolled through extended or continuing education, summer session, or those students receiving services through the National Center on Deafness at CSU Northridge are not included in data collected by the system each fall term.

While many students have more than one disability, the information in the following charts and graphs describe students by their primary disability only.

Although there are six types of disability categories, historically the largest number of students served have possessed learning disabilities. In fall 2000, 43.5 percent of all students with disabilities served had learning disabilities as their primary disability.

Enrollment Reported by Disabled Student Services Programs, Fall 1980 to Fall 2000

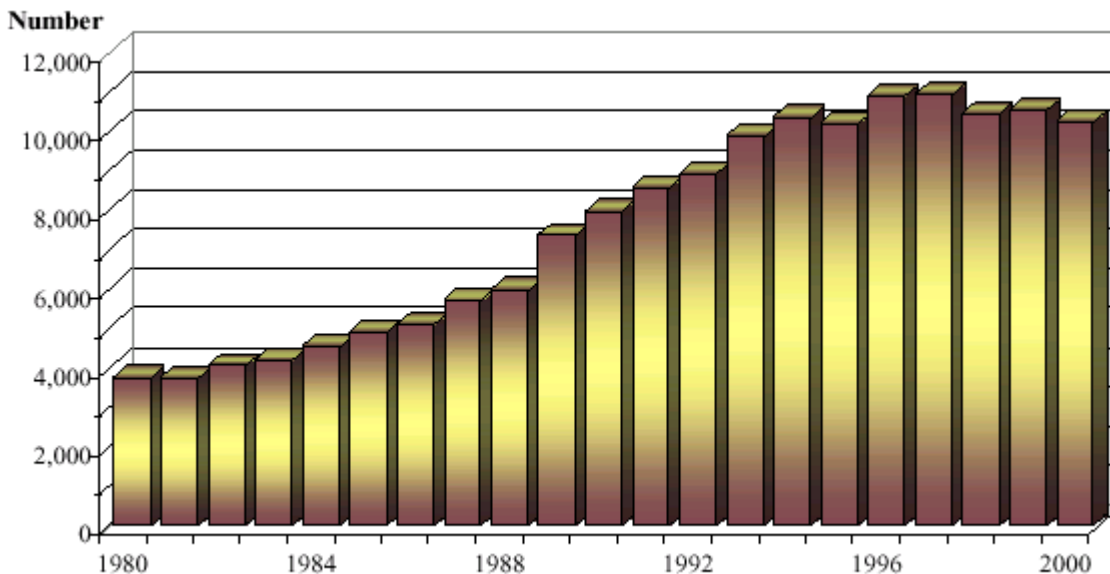

Learning Disabled Students in Disabled Student Services Programs, Fall 1980 to Fall 2000

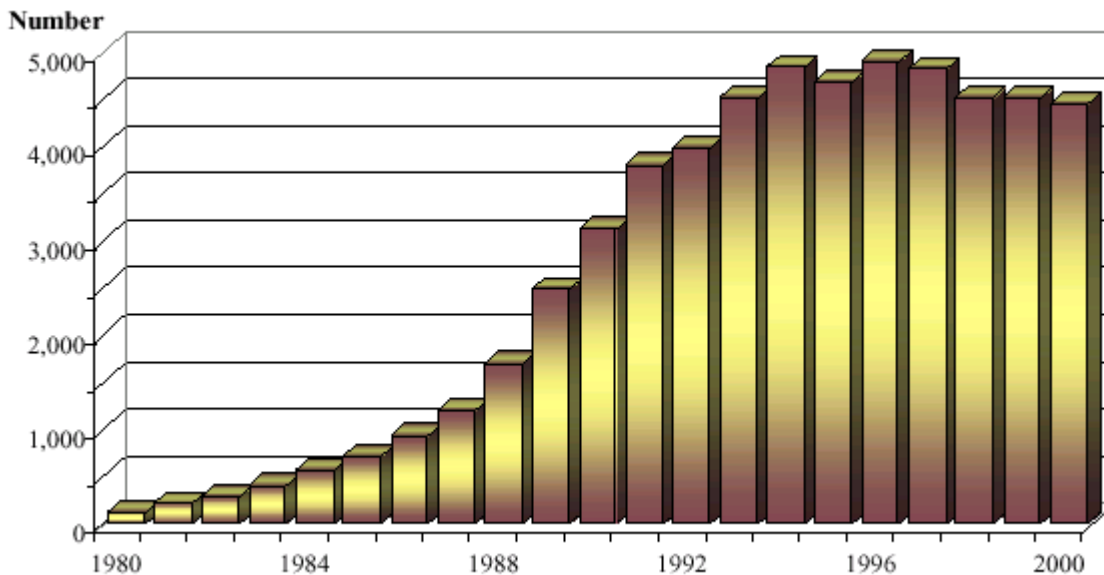

Enrollment of Disabled Students by Type of Disability, Fall 2000

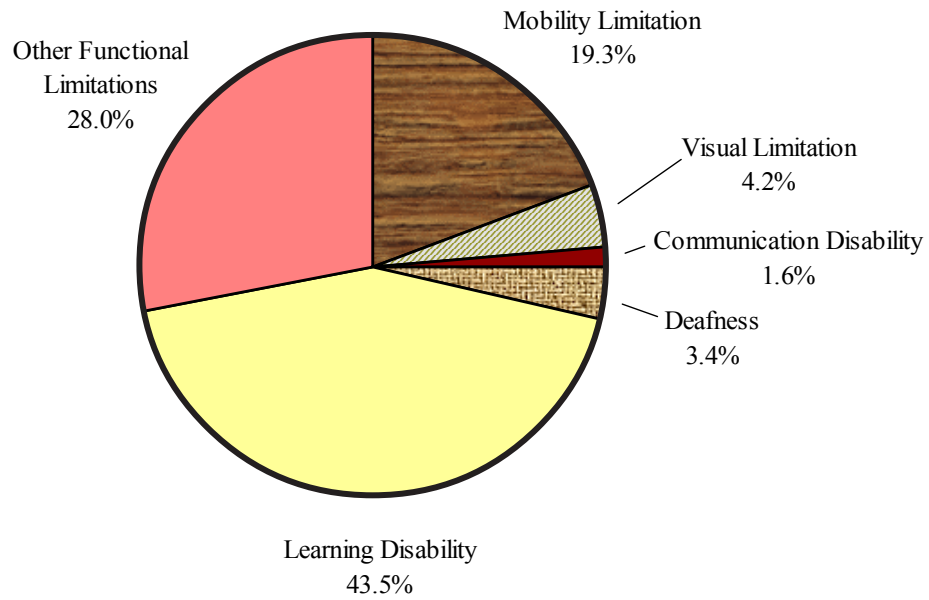
