California State University, Bakersfield (1965)

Since classes were first offered in 1970, two strong traditions have emerged at Cal State Bakersfield: an extraordinary level of student-faculty interaction and a highly personalized learning atmosphere. The schools of Humanities and Social Sciences; Natural Sciences and Mathematics; Business and Public Administration; and Education offer 31 bachelor's and 18 master's degree programs, including e-business, petroleum geology, sports management, computer science, environmental resource management, health care management, and accredited degree programs in business, public administration, social work, education, nursing, and clinical science. Students enjoy a range of extracurricular and social activities, including sororities and fraternities, special interest organizations, and student government. Roadrunner sports teams have won national championships in men's basketball, swimming, wrestling, and soccer, and women's volleyball, tennis, and softball. CSUB will become a full NCAA Division I member in June 2010. The campus is situated on 375 acres in southwest Bakersfield. Campus landmarks include the Stiern Library, the Doré Theater, Madigan Art Gallery, Hillman Aquatic Center, the Antonino Sports Center, the 4,000-seat Icardo Activities Center, and the outdoor amphitheater. New facilities include a science building and a state-of-the-art student recreation center expected to be complete by fall 2008. California State University, Channel Islands (2002)

Cal State Channel Islands opened in fall 2002 as the CSU's 23rd campus. It has developed a reputation for its interdisciplinary approach, its emphasis on service learning, and its multicultural and global perspectives. At CSUCI, students and members of the community are encouraged to participate in the development of its academic and student life programs. Students benefit from small classes that allow one-on-one interaction with top-notch professors. Located only minutes from the Pacific Ocean at the northern end of the Santa Monica Mountains, Cal State Channel Islands is truly breathtaking. The entrance to the campus winds alongside lush agricultural fields, orchards, and picturesque foothills. Equally compelling is the campus architecture. Built in the early part of the twentieth century, the sprawling 1930's Mission Revival and Spanish Colonial Revival buildings house a state-of-the-art, 21st century university. A new landmark is the John Spoor Broome Library completed in April 2008. Designed by renowned architect Lord Norman Foster, it features advanced technology, one of the largest collections of books and data information in the state, and a design that encourages learning, discussion, and intellectual exchange. CSUCI has announced establishment of its first school, the Martin V. Smith School of Business & Economics, and construction of the Martin V. Smith Center for Integrative Decision-Making. CSUCI offers programs in art, applied physics, biology, business, chemistry, Chicana and Chicano studies, communication, computer science, early childhood studies, economics, English, environmental science and resource management, history, information technology, liberal studies, mathematics, nursing, performing arts, political science, psychology, sociology, and Spanish. California State University, Chico (1887)

California State University, Dominguez Hills (1960)

CSU Dominguez Hills is a highly diverse, urban university located in the South Bay primarily serving the greater Los Angeles metropolitan area. This community-based university prides itself on its outstanding faculty and friendly, student-centered environment. Known for its excellence in teacher education, nursing, psychology, business administration, and digital media arts, CSUDH is also a national leader in distance learning. California State University, East Bay (1957)

Located in the San Francisco Bay Area — Cal State East Bay serves its region with a main campus in the Hayward Hills, an upper-division campus in Concord, and a professional development center in Oakland. Facilities include major academic buildings, athletic facilities, a 500-seat theater, a television studio, and Warren Hall (the university's signature 12-story tower) visible throughout much of the region. Planning has also begun for a 53,000 square-foot state-of-the-art Recreation and Wellness Center. With an enrollment of more than 12,700, the University attracts students from throughout the region and from more than 130 countries. Named a "Best in the West" college and "Best Business School" by The Princeton Review, and designated as a "top-tier" masters-granting university in the West by U.S. News and World Report, Cal State East Bay offers more than 100 fields of study and is recognized for its innovative freshman learning communities. California State University, Fresno (1911)

Fresno State offers 59 bachelor's degree majors, 44 master's degrees, and a joint doctorate in educational leadership with the University of California. The programs have two objectives: self-understanding and career preparation. Nearly all programs provide practical career applications of classroom knowledge. In addition to outstanding offerings in the arts, sciences, and humanities, the Fresno campus enjoys a long-standing reputation of excellence in agriculture, business, education, engineering, and professional areas such as nursing, industrial technology, and social work. The Fresno State Winery, the first licensed and bonded winery at a university in the U.S., has produced numerous award-winning wines. The Smittcamp Family Honors College admits 50 of the state's top high school graduates each year with full academic scholarships. Three nearby national parks—Yosemite, Kings Canyon, and Sequoia—provide numerous educational and recreational opportunities. California Maritime Academy (1929)

Established in 1929 as the California Nautical School, the California Maritime Academy became an independent state institution of higher education in 1972, before joining the CSU in 1995. Cal Maritime is one of only seven degree-granting maritime academies in the U.S.—and the only one on the West Coast. This residential campus is located on 87 acres of land adjacent to the Carquinez Strait at the northeastern extreme of San Francisco Bay. A deepwater pier provides berthing space for the Training Ship Golden Bear, as well as a basin for boats. Cal Maritime's faculty of 80 taught some 800 students during college year 2006-2007. A program of intellectual learning, applied technology, and leadership development prepares graduates for positions of responsibility in the areas of international business, logistics, maritime policy, intermodal transportation, and engineering. Six majors lead to bachelor of science degrees in business administration, marine transportation, facilities engineering technology, global studies and maritime affairs, marine engineering technology, and mechanical engineering. Students can also earn professional licensing as a Third Mate or Third Assistant Engineer, Certified Plant Engineer-in-Training, or professional certification in transportation, management, or international business and logistics. California State University, Monterey Bay (1994)

SFSU ranks 16th nationwide in awarding undergraduate degrees to minorities and enrolls the highest number of international students at any comprehensive U.S. university.
