


CSU DOMINGUEZ HILLS


CSU Dominguez Hills is a leader in distance-learning initiatives, offering two unique online programs—a master’s degree in public administration and a master’s degree in engineering management. The engineering degree—the only known program of its kind in the country—is offered jointly with CSU Long Beach. CSU Dominguez Hills is building a new student union and is significantly expanding its university library. The Home Depot Center located at CSU Dominguez Hills is a world-class athletic venue serving the entire region.


The CSU divides its 23 campuses statewide into eight geographic regions whose areas share a common economic base. CSU Dominguez Hills, CSU Fullerton, CSU Long Beach, CSU Los Angeles and CSU Northridge comprise the Los Angeles region (number 6 on the map).

High Magnitude Economic Impact

CSU Dominguez Hills’ annual impact on the Los Angeles region is enormous:

- Annual spending related to CSU Dominguez Hills in the Los Angeles region (\$204 million) generates a total impact of \$388 million on the regional economy.
- This impact sustains more than 6,000 jobs in the region, and generates nearly \$20 million per year in tax revenue.
- Even greater—\$638 million of the earnings by alumni from CSU Dominguez Hills are attributable to their CSU degrees.

CSU Dominguez Hills improves California's economy with research, education, and an entrepreneurial spirit.

- The CSU produces 64 percent of the state's graduates in nursing, and many of the campuses are recognized for the high quality of their science programs. CSU Dominguez Hills, for example, received a 100 percent positive response from all 170 employers in the BSN Employer survey asking if they would continue to hire its nursing graduates. In the same survey, 95 percent of CSU Dominguez Hills nursing graduates were rated "good" to "excellent" by employers.
- CSU campuses consistently earn national accolades for the quality of their teaching programs. Some of the campuses, for example, house alternatives to large, traditional high schools. The California Academy of Math and Science on the CSU Dominguez Hills campus is one such example.
- Online courses are a natural part of California's high technology knowledge economy. CSU Dominguez Hills' College of Business Administration and Public Policy was recognized by the *Wall Street Journal* in 2003 as among the top 10 "best buys" in online programs.
- CSU campuses have developed a strong focus on understanding the information technology and engineering innovation needs of companies that surround them. The Information Systems Research Center at CSU Dominguez Hills offers training and research services, as well as testing and evaluation of new technologies, for local companies.

CSU Dominguez Hills improves life in the Los Angeles region through community service, arts, culture, and sports.

The CSU's NCAA athletic programs draw more than 1.9 million spectators annually. These athletic events are enhanced by the high quality of sporting facilities on CSU campuses, such as the world-class Home Depot Center at CSU Dominguez Hills for soccer and tennis. The center is an official U.S. Olympic training site and is home to major league soccer's L.A. Galaxy.

A University for All Californians—

The CSU's student body proudly reflects one of California's greatest strengths—its diversity. CSU Dominguez Hills was named the second most diverse campus in the West by *U.S. News & World Report*. The university's student body is 35 percent African American, 31 percent Hispanic, 23 percent White, 10 percent Asian American/Pacific Islander and 0.6 percent Native American.
