
The CSU divides its 23 campuses statewide into eight geographic regions whose areas share a common economic base. CSU San Bernardino and Cal Poly Pomona comprise the Inland Empire region (number 7 on the map).

High Magnitude Economic Impact

CSU San Bernardino’s annual impact on the Inland Empire region is enormous:

- Annual spending related to CSU San Bernardino in the Inland Empire region (\$299 million) generates a total impact of \$533 million on the regional economy.
- This impact sustains more than 10,000 jobs in the region, and generates more than \$28 million per year in tax revenue.
- Even greater—more than \$600 million of the earnings by alumni from CSU San Bernardino are attributable to their CSU degrees.

CSU San Bernardino improves California’s economy with research, education, and an entrepreneurial spirit.

- One reason the CSU succeeds in teacher education is because its programs have strong linkages with local school districts. CSU San Bernardino maintains partnerships with 59 school districts in San Bernardino and Riverside counties. CSU San Bernardino consistently ranks among the top CSU campuses that produce credentialed teachers.
- CSU campuses also have developed institutes to carry out applied research on water issues, such as CSU San Bernardino’s Water Resources Institute, which develops and maintains an extensive range of GIS-based data related to water.
- A wide range of programs at CSU San Bernardino accelerate the economic impact of research and promote entrepreneurial skills, such as the Inland Empire Center for Entrepreneurship, the Inland Empire Women’s Business Center, the Minority Resource Center-Entrepreneurial Training and Technical Assistance Program and the Office of Technology Transfer and Commercialization. CSU San Bernardino’s Inland Empire Center for Entrepreneurship (IECE) ranks among the top 25 regional universities and top 75 American universities for entrepreneurs by *Entrepreneur Magazine*.
- The University Center for Developmental Disabilities is a clinical training program that provides evaluation, assessment, training and support for autistic children, their parents and siblings. It is a clinical training program of the College of Education’s Special Education credential program and works in

cooperation with the departments of Nursing, Social Work and Psychology. The clinical program is under contract with the San Bernardino County Regional Center for client services.

CSU San Bernardino improves life in the Inland Empire region through community service, arts, culture, and sports.

- CSU students and staff contribute valuable resources and time to their communities. CSU San Bernardino is particularly active in health care. More than 40 percent of the campus’ Federal Work Study students participate in community service activities.
- CSU campuses celebrate the cultural diversity of the state by hosting multicultural activities. At CSU San Bernardino, California Native American Culture Awareness Week is held every September. The center also organizes the San Manuel Pow Wow.
- The CSU San Bernardino university community is a reflection of the dynamic diversity of the local region, with a student population so diverse that there is no majority ethnic group on campus. CSU San Bernardino ranks among the national leaders for Hispanic enrollment, as well as four-year universities and colleges that award bachelor’s and master’s degrees to Hispanic students. With a full-time-equivalent enrollment of 34 percent Hispanic students, CSU San Bernardino is designated as a Hispanic Serving Institution by the U.S. Department of Education.
