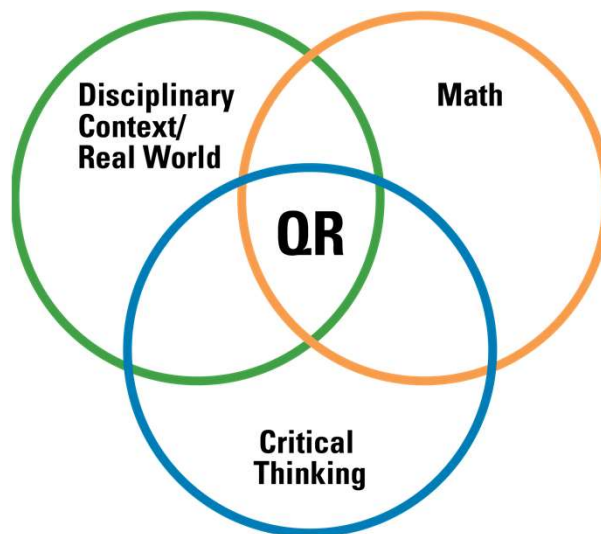

CSU Proposal

- Beginning in 2027, incoming first-year students must have completed one additional course of quantitative reasoning
 - Could be fulfilled by coursework in science, math or an elective with a quantitative reasoning foundation
 - Automatic exemption process established
- Students encouraged to take the course in their senior year of high school
- Implementation plan to support students and schools

Today's Requested Action

- Approval of Phased Implementation Plan for Modification of CSU's Admission Requirements to Include an Additional Quantitative Reasoning Course
 - Consider Title 5 change by spring 2022 with fall 2027 effective date
 - Chancellor to submit to Board progress reports (March 2021 and January 2022):
 - Third-party, independent analysis of requirement's implementation and impacts
 - Progress on STEM-qualified teacher preparation
 - Clarity on charge, role and composition of steering committee
 - Progress on outreach efforts
 - Clarity on student exemptions

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
