Re:	2021-22 One-Time Allocations: Graduation Initiative 2025

Aligned with the Graduation Initiative 2025 Advisory Committee <u>recommendations</u> for eliminating equity gaps across the California State University by 2025, \$15 million in one-time resources will be allocated to targeted campuses in 2021-22, as follows, to achieve the most significant impact in advancing the following three of the five strategic priorities. All 23 CSU campuses are encouraged to pursue these priorities to the greatest extent possible.

- 1. **Re-Engage and Re-Enroll Underserved Students**: (\$3 million) Advance a systemwide reenrollment campaign and establish campus retention targets beginning with the spring 2022 term and continuing for the next three years.
- Expand Credit Opportunities with Summer/Intersession Enrollment: (\$7 million) Supplement enrollment of underrepresented minority (URM) and Pell-recipient students in intersession and summer session with the goal of closing equity gaps in credit accumulation at targeted campuses.
- 3. **Ensure Equitable Access to Digital Degree Roadmaps**: (\$5 million) No later than June 15, 2022, every CSU student will have access to and adoption of a real-time digital degree planner.
