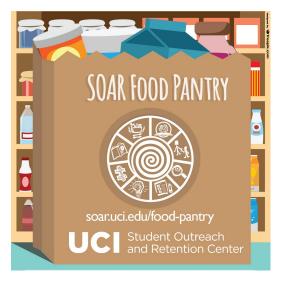

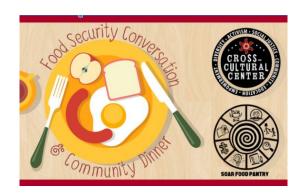

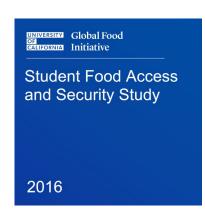


UC Average -Students reporting having experienced food insecurity:

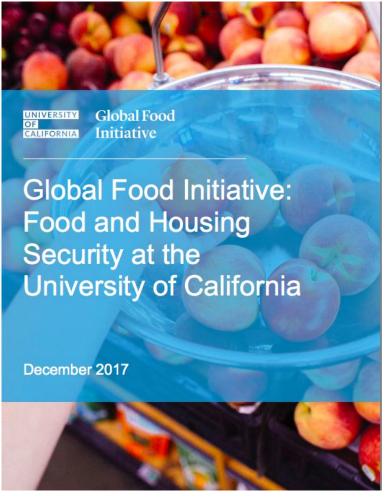

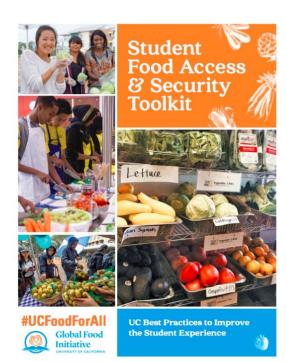

Vision for Basic Needs Hub

- Emergency food and toiletries
- CalFresh Application Assistance
- Resource referral for crisis resolution
- Reduce the stigma associated with food assistance



- Community Kitchenette: to prepare food in a kitchenette complete with blenders, a convection oven, a microwave, coffee machine, etc.
- Participate in the Smart 'Eaters Life Skills Series which gives students the education and skills they need to eat healthy on a budget and to learn how to cook affordable, nutrient-dense foods for themselves
- Student participation via volunteering, internships, fellowships

Process

- Timing was right
 - Space availability
 - GFI grant renewal

 - National conversation shifting beyond food security to Basic Needs security

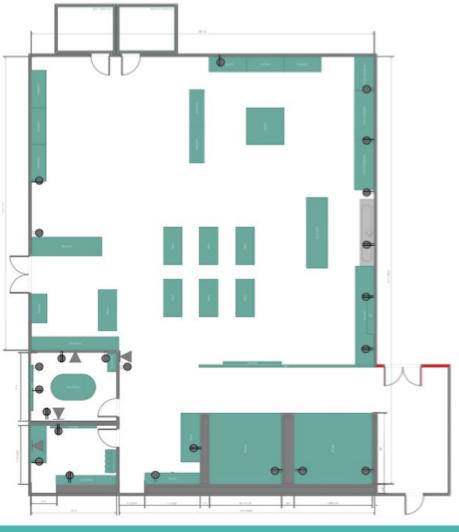

UC Irvine opened the FRESH Basic Needs Hub in September 2017. The Hub provides a 2,630 square foot space where advising, food preparation, community meetings, teaching, CalFresh and Food Pantry services are centralized.

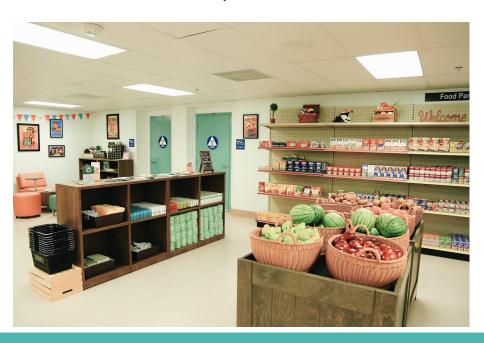

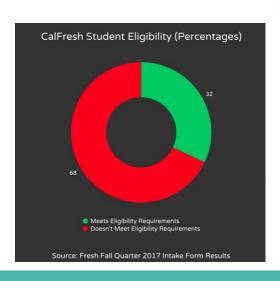




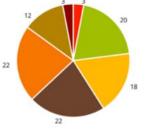

Intake Form

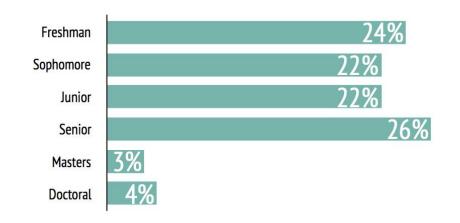

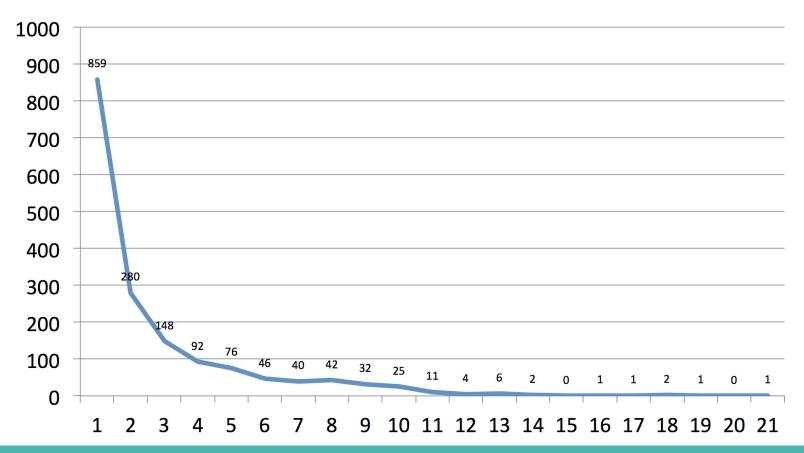

ECRT Emergency Grants

Student Affairs

Application Eligibility:

A student under consideration for the ECR grant must:

- be a currently enrolled undergraduate or graduate student at the University of California, Irvine;
- demonstrate a financial crisis that is affecting their access to housing, food, medical and/or mental health care.

Case-specific, university interventions (e.g., fee deadline extensions, payment plans, rent deferment, emergency loans, emergency meals, etc.) should be utilized first to address a student's financial crisis. If the case-specific interventions alone cannot address the financial crisis, students may be awarded one-time grants through the Economic Crisis Response Team (ECRT). The ECR grant is not to exceed \$1,000 amount per individual, as the funds are not long-term financial solutions.

- Must demonstrate a financial crisis that is affecting access to housing, food, medical and/or mental health care.
- Students are eligible for up to \$1,000.
- Application can be found on basic needs website, financial aid website, and campus social worker website
